
ODE Update

Exciting news! As of Oct. 1, 2018, the Office of Integrated Student Supports was formed to unite programs and initiatives that meet the needs of the whole child, a key strategy of Ohio's Strategic Plan for Education, Each Child Our Future.

The Office of Integrated Student Supports leads the implementation and oversight of programs and initiatives that encompass the whole child, including all child nutrition programs and initiatives centered around school climate, social and emotional learning, positive behavioral intervention and supports, behavioral health, school-based health, policy for the Medicaid in Schools Program, anti-harassment intimidation and bullying, safety, and family and community engagement. The office also leads the implementation of programs in support of special student populations, including English learners, students in foster care, homeless youth, migrant and justice-involved youth.

All contact persons, phone numbers and emails will remain the same for Office of Integrated Student Supports programs. It is our hope that this newly formed office will collaborate across programs and initiatives to help more children thrive and succeed in Ohio.

How do child nutrition programs align with homeless students? Students who are homeless; those that lack a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence, may experience many social emotional, and academic challenges that stem from lack of a stable living situation. These students are categorically eligible for free school meals. Approximately 75% of the students in Ohio that experience homelessness



are living in doubled up situations (Sharing the housing of others due to hardship and lack of alternative). The Mc Kinney-Vento Act and its provisions are designed to provide students with stability and consistency in the school setting. Total homeless youth anytime count was 30,970.

• Typically, 50% of all children in shelters or transitional housing are under the age of five years old.

To support the needs of this vulnerable population school districts are required to name a homeless liaison who will assist the district in identifying, enrolling, and supporting the needs of the student and family during the episode of homelessness. The district is charged with removing all barriers to the student's full participation in school activities. Students are eligible (at a minimum) for nutrition services, Title I educational supports and transportation services.

As our office continues to support the whole child, knowing that the program office staff has a correctional education coordinator who has spent the last six months visiting Ohio's thirty-six county juvenile detention facilities and eleven community correction facilities. The goal of these visits is to interface with both facility directors and education program directors and educate them on ways in which this newly created position can assist them on implementing the five guiding principles recommended by the federal government for providing high-quality education within Ohio's juvenile justice system. Child Nutrition feeds students in most of these facilities through the national school lunch program.

Can your school wellness committee and policy fit here? The Ohio School-Based Health Care Toolkit

was developed as a collaboration between the Ohio Department of Education, Ohio Department of Medicaid, Ohio Department of Health, Governor's Office of Health Transformation, and the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services. The toolkit offers tactical advice and resources for schools and care providers partnering for school-based health care work. The toolkit is available to all on the website.

The overarching goals of school-based health care are to 1.) reduce the rate of chronic absenteeism and 2.) increase the availability and accessibility of primary and preventative care. Services can include primary care, mental health care, oral health, vision care, sexual and reproductive health, nutrition and physical activity promotion, education, vaccinations, and referrals to outside services. Services may be offered on-site in dedicated clinic spaces, in offsite spaces linked to a care providers practice, even in a mobile clinic.

The Ohio School-Based Health Care Network includes 17 participating districts and schools statewide looking to build or expand their existing school-based health care work. Working with these districts and schools, we provide additional guidance and support to do just that.

Did you know? English learners are one of Ohio's fasting growing student subgroups. From 2007 to 2017, the number of English learners has increased 85% (+26,892 students). Ohio schools reported 58,603 English learners in school year 2016-17, which was approximately 3.5% of total K-12 enrollment. **USDA provides multiple translation of school meal application materials on the USDA food and nutrition website.**

"English learners" are students whose primary language is other than English and who need special language assistance to effectively participate in schools where English is the language of instruction. English learners (ELs) may struggle in classes when they do not have access to high quality language supports. ELs, particularly those with limited or interrupted formal education, are a vulnerable student population facing challenges related to language, socioeconomic status and immigration.

As with other vulnerable student populations, ELs are disproportionately impacted by system disparities and discrimination. To minimize negative impacts, schools have a number of obligations to ELs and their families. Schools must ensure ELs can participate meaningfully and equally in educational programs and that parents and guardians of ELs have access to information about their children in a language they can understand.

To support its ELs, the Ohio Department of Education's Lau Resource Center provides professional development, guidance and technical assistance to Ohio school professionals. Department resources guide EL education, including the Ohio English Language Proficiency Standards and Instructional Guide for English Learners. Funding to support ELs is available through Ohio Revised Code 3317.016 and participation in the U.S. Department of Education's Title III grant. Training Opportunities:

The Office for Integrated Student Supports hosted the annual Child Nutrition Training and Vendor Show on November 28, 2018, with more than 50 educational sessions and 50 vendors. Special shout out to Chris Burkhardt, who presented on School Nutrition Association updates. Thank you Chris!

The next Training and Vendor Show will occur in Summer 2019! Additional training and conference opportunities include the Summer Summit on February 12, 2019, at the Mid-Ohio Food Bank in Grove City, OH, and School Nutrition Program Basic and Regional Trainings throughout the school year and summer. The next two scheduled Basic Training opportunities are January 11 and May 24 at the Ohio Department of Agriculture in Reynoldsburg, OH. Procurement Reviews:

Local Agency Procurement Reviews are conducted every three years for each sponsor. A procurement review serves to ensure that sponsors follow and meet federal, state and local procurement rules and regulations. The sponsor must provide a listing of all vendors used for school nutrition program expenditures in the reviewed school year. From that list, ODE reviews a random selection of vendors.

The procurement review is conducted online. All required information and documentation must be uploaded into the Claims Reimbursement and Reporting System (CRRS). If ODE requests additional documentation from the sponsor, all subsequent documentation must be uploaded into the CRRS. The sponsor can view procurement review results, findings, and/or corrective actions in the CRRS.

Child Nutrition Program Flexibilities for School Year 2018-2019:

Effective July 1, 2018, temporary revisions for milk, grain and sodium can be read <u>here</u>. These terms cover the 2018-2019 school year. Guidance will be provided when it is made available from USDA.

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
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
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SAVE THE DATES!!
